- All submissions should be in Microsoft Word.doc.
- Accepted papers will be published in the workshop CD proceedings.

- Copyright information: Submission of a paper to the workshop indicates the author's permission to publish the paper in electronic format for distribution without compensation to the author.

Text

The paper should include:

- title
- author's name(s), affiliation and present address
- abstract (maximum 200 words)
- key words (maximum of six)
- body text
- a conclusion section
- a reference section (see below)
- References should be indicated in the text by a number in square brackets, e.g. [1].

EDITORIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARING WORKSHOP PAPERS

Key words

cooperation, research, transport, velocity, safety, training

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1. Introduction

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The papers for the workshop should be written in English language. The paper has to be of number of pages 15 – including tables, figures and the final summary. Please use numeration of pages. The workshop Proceedings will be published at CD, therefore tables, and figures could be full-coloured. You are kindly requested to send good quality material. However the file size should not exceed 2.5 MB.

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2. Detailed indications

2.1. Paper processing

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A page size should be A4 with the top margin:

- 2.5 + 6.0 = 8.5 cm on the first page,
- 2.5 cm on the next pages.

The bottom, left and right margins are 2.5 cm, so the width of paper text is 16.0 cm, written in Times New Roman (TNR, size 12 dpi) and being aligned to side margins.

The title of paper should be centred and printed in capital letters (TNR, 14 dpi – bold). Name and surname of author (authors) have to be placed under the title of a paper without academic and professional degrees (TNR, 12 dpi – bold, centred). Note about the author(s), as well as contact information should be given in the footnote at the bottom of the first page (size 10 dpi; see an example). The chapter titles should be numbered and aligned to the left margin (TNR, 12 dpi – bold).

Please use the processor MS Word.

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2.2. Formulas, tables and figures

1 free line (12 dpi)

Formulas should be centred and written by equation editor with clear readability of indexes and exponents, using Greek symbols if needed. For example, the energy (E) necessary to prepare a paper for our workshop can be estimated, as follows:

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$$E = \alpha m c^2 \tag{1}$$

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where:

α – coefficient of difficulty of presented problems ($1 \leq \alpha < 2$),

m – mass of the author(s),

c – velocity of writing a paper.

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Formula numbers should be given in brackets and aligned to the right margin.

The tables and figures have to be centred (TNR, 12 dpi – italic):
